## Made in America

When these words appear on a product you bought, do you ever wonder exactly where it came from? Technology often comes from California and cars, from Michigan, but what about South Dakota? With our scenic ranches and rolling fields, you might be surprised that the second biggest industry in South Dakota is manufacturing. In fact, some impressive products are made in places you might not expect.

Driving east from Wall, down Highway 14 toward Pierre, the grazing cattle, train tracks, and nameless gravel roads assure you that you're in the country. However, once you reach the small town of Philip, you might not realize that this rural setting is home to one of South Dakota's great manufacturing stories, Scotchman Industries. For fifty years, Scotchman has been making their most popular item, the Ironworker, but to see how they've made it this far you need to start at the beginning.


Scotchman's founder, Arthur A. "Art" Kroetch, was born in 1926 in Hilland, an area of Haakon County about twenty miles northwest of Philip. Art attended school through the eighth grade before going to work on his family's ranch, a common practice at the time. Art spent his early years helping at neighboring farms and operating a custom having business. In 1950, Art married the love of his life, Eleanor, and entered the U.S. Army shortly thereafter to serve his country during the Korean War. After his honorable discharge, Art returned to his having business for a few years before starting a salvage yard in Philip in 1956.

The workload at Art's Salvage consisted mainly of fixing agricultural things like gates, chutes and tractors. Eventually, Art began fabricating products of his own design, like a cattle oiler that dispersed insecticide over the backs of curious cows.

As Art's business began to grow and diversify, he found himself in need of a safe and easy to use metal fabrication machine, leading him to a Minnesota man selling hydraulic powered ironworkers. The hydraulic ironworker was a unique machine, with the ability to shear, punch and bend metal using hydraulic

pressure. In the 1960's, ironworkers more commonly used flywheels, an effective but unreliable and often dangerous device. Realizing the safety and potential of the new hydraulic machine, Art bought the U.S. patent for the Dvorak Hydraulic Ironworker in 1967. This wise investment would pave the way for Art's Salvage to grow into the ironworker manufacturer now called Scotchman Industries.

"Dad was a very kind and giving person," said Jerry Kroetch, one of Art's seven children and the current CEO of Scotchman. "He believed very deeply in his faith in God, his faith in his family and in the community of Philip," added Jerry. Which is why in 1967, the only place in the world to



purchase a hydraulic ironworker was from Art's twelve-employee factory in rural South Dakota. Fifty years have gone by and Scotchman Industries is the oldest and largest ironworker manufacturer in the U.S., now with eighty employees and a wide array of metal fabrication products.

The Ironworker has remained as Scotchman's flagship product and they currently sell thirteen models, ranging from 45 to 150 tons of hydraulic pressure. Scotchman Ironworkers are found everywhere from high school shop classes to repair shops at Fortune 500 factories. There's even a Scotchman Ironworker at the New York City Opera House, tucked away three stories up, working behind the scenes on set construction and repairs. It's not easy to describe everything the Ironworker can do, but check out Scotchman on YouTube (youtube.com/scotchman1979) for videos and tutorials of the Ironworkers in action.

As companies grow in size and offerings over the years, the need to expand and relocate often leads them away from their hometowns, but not Scotchman. "We have never considered moving the factory to any other place and my dad spent his lifetime making sure Scotchman stayed in this community," said Jerry. "Philip and the people of Philip were and always will be important to the Kroetch family."

Early in his life, Jerry was singing a different tune when it came to his personal desire to stay in Philip. "When you're born and raised in a small town, you want to leave right after high school," said Jerry. "I went to Gillette to work during an oil boom, but came back to Philip after a while. I started at Scotchman as a welder in the machine shop then moved into customer service and now I'm the CEO. Needless to say, I've been with the company for thirty-nine years and I love living and working in Philip."

Jerry isn't the only Kroetch still associated with Scotchman, either. His high school sweetheart and wife of thirty-seven years, Karen, is the Vice President of Finance. Their son Josh is a Sales Representative based out of Minneapolis and their daughter Brooke heads up the Marketing department, along with a host of Kroetch relatives, too. Of course, it takes more than just family to keep Scotchman going the past fifty years. As you might expect from a large employer in a small town, many of the employees at Scotchman are the second or third generation of their family to work there. Scotchman has grown and succeeded in the town where it began because of the people of Philip and by embracing technology and change. Scotchman stays competitive by using their website and active social media pages to keep the Ironworker a mouse click away from metalworkers around the world. Scotchman also invested in technology upgrades for their factory to streamline the manufacturing practices that have served them well the past fifty years.

Maintaining their reputation as the most reliable ironworker manufacturer in the U.S. for fifty years is remarkable. What started as humble beginnings in Art's Salvage all those years ago has morphed into a South Dakota institution. With his son Jerry at the helm of Scotchman Industries, Art's legacy lives on as one that was, is, and will remain, made in America.

To celebrate fifty years of the Ironworker, Scotchman is hosting an open house on September 27 from 9 am to 3 pm at the factory in Philip. Guided tours and refreshments will be provided, and one lucky school will win a brand new Scotchman Ironworker.
