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# **Telling Their Stories**

## Tom Rancour honors veterans with military display in Wasta.

Tom Rancour is many things. He is a father and a husband, an engineer and a business owner. He is a Golden West member, avid military surplus collector and historian. Tom is the founder, curator and operator of Armed Forces Display and Gifts (AFD&G) in Wasta, a small town located about 35 miles east of Rapid City. You have no doubt cruised right by it when going to or from the Black Hills. AFD&G is the big building in Wasta, just behind the Mobile station with an A-4C Skyhawk attack jet perched in the parking lot.

Yet, there is one more term to describe Tom Rancour, and that's storyteller. His primary reason for creating the AFD&G is to preserve and tell the stories of real-life heroes, members of America's armed forces. While the story of Tom's life is interesting in its own right, he is far more interested in telling the stories of veterans, making certain their service and sacrifice stay etched in our minds. Thanks to Tom's diligence, dedication and research, here are three stories about veterans featured at the AFD&G.





### Bill Kerr - US Army

(Formerly of Yankton, SD. Passed away March 2018)

Bill Kerr was fresh out of high school when he joined the US Army in 1944. Standing 6'7" with a size 16 shoe, Bill was over the Army's height limit and didn't have to join. The Army's reasoning, they did not want to stock special clothing and boots outside of "normal" sizes. Despite being given this easy out, Bill followed his heart and joined the Army. Before too long, Bill found himself on a troop ship in Boston Harbor in December of 1944, with a one-way ticket to France.



A member of the US Army's 119th Infantry Regiment, Bill's stay in France was short lived as he boarded a train headed for southern Holland, toward the Battle of the Bulge. His company made inroads into Germany, securing towns and clearing houses. Weeks later, after crossing the Rhine as part of the Allies final push to victory, Bill happened upon a German officer's dress sword while clearing a house. Not wanting to draw the attention of his commanding officers, who would confiscate the sword, Bill used his long legs to his advantage - he hid the sword down a pant leg. It required him to walk in an odd fashion, but he had his prize!

Shortly after, his platoon was shelled and Bill took a piece of shrapnel to the wrist. The piece hit him flat, leaving his arm numb and wrist bruised, but intact. Bill headed to the aid station to have

his wrist examined. The doctor saw Bill walking strangely and insisted he strip down to check for leg wounds. Not wanting his prized souvenir discovered, he insisted he was fine other than his wrist. The doctor relented, sending Bill to an aid station near Paris until his wrist healed. Once in the clear, Bill took no more chances and quickly shipped his treasured sword back home. You can see the sword and a few other


souvenirs from Bill's time

### Mauer Family - US Air Force (Richard - Current resident of Wall, SD)

Staff Sergeant Richard Mauer started guite the tradition when he joined the US Air Force (USAF) in 1954. His three sons and one grandson all followed suit, also serving their country as members of the USAF. His sons are Colonel Tony Mauer (retired), Lieutenant Colonel John Mauer (USAF Reserves) and Senior Airman Paul Mauer (retired), and his grandson is Major David Mauer (active).



Tony and John, although separated by years and career paths, have seen their paths cross in a way that is unique to the USAF. Tony Mauer's specialty is piloting a KC-135 Stratotanker, a large fuel-tanker that extends a boom (fuel line) to other planes and re-fuels them mid-flight.

John, on the other hand, began his career as a back-seater in F-4 and F-15 fighters. Back-seater is Air Force jargon for the weapons systems officer seated behind the fighter pilot. More recently, John has been the navigator on an E-3 Sentry, a plane designed to provide all-weather surveillance, command, control and communications for the USAF.

Three times these brothers have crossed paths at high altitude, sharing brief encounters from their respective cockpits while Tony's KC-135 provided fuel to John's F-4, F-15 and E-3. While aerial refueling is not a rarity in the USAF, it is unique to say that in those three instances, Tony truly was his brother's keeper. ## John (Jack) O'Malley - US Navy

(Born, raised and residing in Hot Springs, SD)

In 1966, Jack O'Malley was an Ensign in the United States Navy, reporting to Pensacola, FL for flight training. Upon completing his training in 1967, Jack received the prestigious "Wings of Gold," to signify his completion of the highly respected and rigorous Naval Aviator training. Jack was then assigned to a Naval Air Station in Lemoore, CA where he trained to fly the A-4C Skyhawk light attack aircraft.



After completion of fleet training in the A-4C Skyhawk, Jack was assigned to the USS Ticonderoga (the Tico) during the Vietnam War. From February to August in 1969, the Tico was deployed to the Gulf of Tonkin off the northeast coast of Vietnam. During this deployment, Jack flew 89 combat missions with over 100 arrested day/night landings aboard the Tico. An arrested landing is landing on an aircraft carrier with assistance from a hook and cable system. Due to the short length of the carrier's runway, this is a very difficult and challenging act.

Jack retired from the Navy in 1986 at the rank of Commander. He is credited with over 2,000 flight hours, and 300 day/night landings in the A-4C Skyhawk and the A-7E Corsair light attack aircraft. Visit the AFD&G to see Jack's flight suit and an A-4C Skyhawk similar to the one Jack flew.

To see and read more about the veterans who've served this great nation, stop into the AFD&G. Tom Rancour's passion for keeping our veterans' stories alive is prominently on display and definitely worth the trip.

The AFD&G is scheduled to be open May 15 through October 1, Tuesdays through Saturdays from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM. Due to Tom's busy work schedule, please call AFD&G's Golden West landline (605-993-3007) to schedule a visit or see if they will be open upon your arrival.

Admission is \$4 per person and children 10 and under are free.




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# Scholarship Opportunity
